# RSB responds to Professor Adrian Smith's call for evidence on future frameworks for international collaboration on research and innovation

The RSB response advises on the opportunities and support mechanisms that could arise with future funding frameworks in consideration of current challenges and UK priorities. Here we advocate the importance of funding to support the Government's objective to reach 2.4% of GDP invested in R&D by 2027, in addition to current funding schemes, association with EU programmes, and the provision of UK Aid. In our response, we also describe how future frameworks must support discovery research, and enable early career researchers to lead and collaborate internationally.
