Plant Health Undergraduate Studentships

Nine summer studentship projects on plant health are available for bioscience undergraduates. The selected students will work with leading plant health researchers, gaining great experience as well as receiving a bursary. The projects will run for 10 weeks over summer 2018. The studentships are arranged by the UK Plant Sciences Federation (UKPSF) with funding from Defra, BSPP and N8 AgriFood. Deadline for applications: 9 May 2018.

Sustainable Development Programme 2018

The British Academy has launched the second round of its Sustainable Development Programme, which is supported by the UK Government's £1.5billion Global Challenges Research Fund.

Closes 30 May 2018.

Innovation to commercialisation of university research (ICURe)

ICURe is a programme of commercialisation support for teams of academic researchers wishing to explore the commercial potential of their research. It aims to improve commercial awareness amongst academic personnel, to develop and enhance the entrepreneurial skills of early career researchers, and to strengthen links between academic and industrial communities. The programme accepts applications from teams based at all UK universities and from all disciplines.

Launch of UKRI Future Leaders Fellowships scheme

The UKRI Future Leaders Fellowship scheme (FLF) aims to develop, retain, attract and sustain research and innovation talent in the UK. Providing up to seven years of funding, for at least 550 early-career researchers and innovators, the scheme will tackle difficult and novel challenges.
